Seventh Sunday of Easter (Year C - Luke)
The readings for today's Masses can be found in the Parish Mass Book, pp.281-2 There are many reasons to be glad that our bishops restored the celebration of the Ascension to Thursday. It took place 40 days after Easter (Acts 1.3b), and it enables us to make a novena (nine days) of prayer to the Holy Spirit in anticipation of Pentecost. It also puts the Catholic Church here in the UK in union with our sister Catholic Churches on the continent who celebrate Ascension on Thursday (and make a long weekend of it!), as well as with the Church of England, here.

We saw at Ascension that, although the apostles and disciples were sad at Jesus' departure from them, and not a little perplexed, they gained great selfconfidence from the knowledge that the on-going proclamation of the kingdom of God, with which Jesus launched his public ministry, now depended on them. The Ascension, then, is the "coming of age" of Christian adults. The mission of the Church has been entrusted to us. We gain in self-confidence through the trust Jesus has placed in us, even as we also realise that the task is enormous, and that, from our own resources alone, we are not adequate to it. Then we remember that Jesus promised to send the Spirit, the Paraclete, the 'advocate', who will guide and direct our efforts, and constantly remind us of Jesus. The readings this Sunday catch the Church in precisely that moment - between the moment of growing up, and the moment of being resourced for the mission by the Spirit.

First Reading (NT): Acts of the Apostles 7, 55-60: Jesus has ascended and entered into glory. And young Stephen, a Greek-speaking Jewish convert to Christianity, is the first person on record to have seen Jesus in his new, heavenly, and permanent state. This is not strictly speaking a 'resurrection appearance' or vision, but it is comparable to what Paul experienced on the road to Damascus, which Paul was absolutely convinced was no different to that experienced by the women at the empty tomb and the apostles, and that it gave him the authority to preach as an apostle. Paul (Saul at this moment) plays a cameo role in the aftermath to Stephen's vision, and one cannot help feeling that as Stephen gazed into heaven he was already in that other world into which his subsequent martyrdom would usher him.

Second Reading (NT): Apocalypse 22, 12 -14, 16 -17, 20: This short passage from the Book of Revelation sets Jesus in the glory which Stephen saw. Indeed specific reference is made to the martyrs: those who have 'washed their robes clean in the blood of the Lamb'. They are the ones who will gain entry to the city. Jesus is clearly there while John, author of the Book of the Apocalypse, realises that he is here. And yet he knows that Jesus promised that he would soon return and one of the earliest prayers Christians made was 'Come, Lord Jesus.'

Gospel: John 17, 20-26: Here is another extract from Jesus' great priestly prayer at the Last Supper. Conscious that he will soon enter into glory, he promises to enable his disciples to share that glory already - in this world - and involves them in the life and communion he enjoys with his heavenly Father, at whose right hand he now sits.

## Prayer of Preparation for Mass

After this prayer until the bell at the start of Mass is an opportunity to pray silently together in preparation.
ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, so that we may truly love you and worthily praise your holy name; through our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

I am very pleased to say that Bishop John Sherrington has reserved 25 September 2022 to come to celebrate Mass for us and to confirm both young people and adults who, after proper preparation, may ask for this sacrament.

## Returning to Sunday Mass from Pentecost

Following their Spring meeting the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales made an announcement about the socalled "Sunday Obligation"
"The challenges of the pandemic have lessened significantly. Most people have resumed the wide range of normal activities, no longer restricted by the previous Covid measures. We therefore believe that the reasons that prevented Catholics from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation no longer apply.
"It has always been the understanding of the Church that when the freedom of any Catholic to attend Mass in person is impeded for a serious reason, because of situations such as ill health, care for the sick, or legitimate fear, this is not a breach of the Sunday Obligation."

## Preparing for next week's Mass

I want to encourage you all to prepare more for Sunday Mass. You may have a Sunday Missal or app like 'Universalis' that helps you find them quickly. But if not, these are the readings for next Sunday, Pentecost: Acts 2.1-11; Romans 8.8-17; John 14, 15-16, 23-26. Knowing and loving the Scriptures is key to insight and confidence as Catholic Christians.
