

- ◆ A prayer BEFORE all Sunday Masses: ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name: through Christ our Lord. Please, now keep silence together until Mass begins.

REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures Early in 2020 we were all hearing mysterious news about a kind of pneumonia of unknown cause detected in Wuhan, China. The rest is history. 2020 also saw the 1600th anniversary of St Jerome's death. His translation of the bible into Latin was the standard text for generations. It was also the 10th anniversary of Pope Benedict's apostolic exhortation, The Word of the Lord; and Pope Francis summoned every Catholic diocese to a 'Year of the Bible'. Our bishops' conference set www.godwhospeaks.uk (it's still there, full of good things - do visit). But the sudden onset of the C-19 and the closure of churches for public worship on 20 March that year threw us off the scent a little. To be fair it's also true to say that many people turned to their Bible or their missal during that awful experience, to find spiritual nourishment. But then the pandemic subsided (thank God!), and inevitably we were dragged back into what we laughably call 'normal life'.

St Jerome's advice then, is timely: 'Christians! ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ himself.' (Commentary on Isaiah). That is, if you don't know the Scripture, you don't know Christ. Don't kid

yourselves any different, he warns. Remember the journey to Emmaus? "Beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, lesus explained to them all the things in the Scriptures concerning Himself." Knowing the Scriptures means knowing Christ. Today's scripture readings invite us to engage again with the word of God and invites us not only to reflect on the various ways that we encounter it, but also challenges us to respond to it.

At Mass the word is proclaimed, it is read by a member of our congregation in such a way that all of us hear it. It is often easier to understand it when it is read clearly, distinctly, and thoughtfully. And it moves us. The same words are being read to everyone in church (locally and worldwide). And yet most of us feel the word is being addressed to us personally, to us as individuals who matter to God. Many of us too get the feeling that 'Today the word is deliberately designed to speak to me with the particular worries that drag me down, with the dreams that keep me hopeful, with the unique experiences of my life. Today's old testament reading assures us that God's word is never proclaimed and heard without some kind of response, however indirect, however far in the future. The Gospel parable of the sower, one of Jesus' bestknown, focuses on our response to God's word.

So, God speaks to the whole Church, He speaks to our particular parish family, and He speaks to you and me all in the same moment! The message of the parable is

fairly obvious (even if it is one of few that Jesus took the trouble to explain) and the question it poses is this: 'Is *my soul/heart/mind* fertile ground for the word of God, and once I have heard and understood it how does it grow? May be the harder question is, 'Is *our parish life* fertile ground for the word of God?'

First Reading (OT): Isaiah 55.10–11 What is emphasised here in this reading is that the word of God has a power and dynamism such as to produce fruit.

Second Reading (NT): Romans 8.18–23 Much discussion in the media has focused on the new world, the new way of doing things, the new priorities after coronavirus. People say history will be divided between BC (before Corona) and AC (after). Paul here describes a much more powerful dynamic of a new dispensation that's not only global, it's galactic. The Holy Spirit is the power which drives creation.

Gospel: Matthew 13.1–23 We are used to being bombarded by media: politics and advertising is everywhere. Tweets are like massive billboards. God does not blitz us with his word. It is like a tiny seed, it comes to us almost unknown, yet it can produce great fruit.
