Reflect on next week's readings (Jeremiah 20.10-13; Rom 12.12-15; Matthew 10.26-33) with the help of wednesdayword.org A WARM WELCOME to Mass today, especially if you are new or an occasional worshipper. Please take this newsletter home and use the calendar to help your daily prayer.

• BEFORE all Sunday Masses, a prayer before worship: ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord.

Afterwards, please keep silent until the Mass begins.

REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures The biblical texts provided for today help us to understand the meaning of the Church in the Lord's plan for mankind. The First Reading recalls the Covenant made on Mount Sinai, during the Exodus from Egypt. God establishes a relationship with a *chosen* people of ex-slaves. The Gospel consists of the account of the call and mission of the Twelve Apostles – a *new* covenant with a *new* Israel. We find the "composition" of the Church here: how can we fail to perceive the implicit invitation addressed to every Christian community to renew its own vocation and missionary drive?

In the biblical way of thinking, a 'covenant' is not a contract or agreement between God and man, but a gift of God to man, which man didn't seek. Not a pact, but a present! We are used to speaking of the 'old' covenant and the 'new' covenant as if there are only two. Historically speaking, God makes several 'covenants' with mankind. The Old Testament is in fact a series of them – the key ones being the covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses and David. St Paul also speaks of several "covenants" to describe God's dealings with Israel (Rom. 9:4). For him, the most important are those with Abraham and Moses, because they relate to the new covenant in Jesus Christ in different ways.

First Reading: Exodus 19.2—6 Our first reading describes, then, one of the great *milestones* of salvation history. It's a moment that exceeds ordinary history, as it reveals the *eternal* plan of the God who makes Covenants. His plan is for the salvation of *all* men and women by setting apart a people whom God proposes will become "my own possession among all peoples" (Ex 19.5). God calls this people to become a "holy nation", not only in the moral sense of holy behaviour, but above all because holiness is its reason to exist. How the destiny and identity of this people is to be understood is gradually made clear in the course of the saving events in the Old Testament; and it is fully revealed with the coming of Jesus Christ.

Second Reading: Romans 5.6—II St Paul teaches how, in the length of time, God sent His Son into the human world – so that 'remaining' divine but 'becoming' human Jesus would *reconcile* God and

Following the jailing this week of a mother-of-three after she induced an abortion after the legal limit, our local bishop, Bishop John said: "Abortion is always a tragedy, both for the mother and for the child who is killed. The consistent teaching of the Catholic Church has always been that both must be protected. The recent case of the mother who aborted her child outside the parameters of the law is deeply distressing for all concerned, especially her other children. However, it is the responsibility of the courts to decide how the law should be applied. I offer prayers for all concerned."

Gospel: Matthew 9.36—10.8 Today's Gospel presents us with a decisive moment in the story of God's plan. In fact, when Jesus called the Twelve' - His future apostles - He wanted to refer symbolically to the 12 tribes of Israel, and even further back to their origins with the 12 sons of Jacob, Abraham's grandson. By placing the Twelve at the centre of His new community, Jesus makes it understood that He came to bring the heavenly Father's design to completion, even if the new face of the Church would appear only at Pentecost (after Jesus's ascension) when the Twelve, "filled with the Holy Spirit" proclaimed the Gospel, and spoke in many languages (Acts 2.3-4). It was then that the universal Church was made clear: a single Body with the Risen Christ its Head; and, at the same time, sent to all the nations of the earth (see Matt 28.19).
