WELCOME to Mass today. **Please take this newsletter home,** and use the calendar to help you pray.

PREPARATION FOR MASS ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord.

Please keep silent after the prayer, until the bell begins the Mass.

ORDER OF MASS See the gold *Parish Mass Book* – start on **p.7**; then, after the Bidding Prayers, go to **p.15**; then, from the Lord's Prayer, **p.56**. The **readings** are to be found **pp.165-168**

Psalm response is 'The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.' After the 10am Mass ... in the Parish Hall – refreshments and chance to connect. Everyone welcome.

Reflection on today's readings Lent is moving quickly, isn't it? The season rolls along whether we're on board or not. And so, we need to be *intentional* in using the season to grow in our spiritual lives. We can either use this season well, or sit it out and let it pass by. This Sunday—Laetare or 'Rejoice!' Sunday—is a Lenten half-time show, a mini-festival intended to refocus our spiritual energies. And yet, the serious purpose of our Lenten pilgrimage remains very much in mind. Today's slight *pause* is a *reminder of our call to holiness* and the *fast-approaching celebration* of the Resurrection of Christ. For those of Irish family heritage, St Patrick's Day often fulfils the same role. For those who have had a bit of a Lenten false-start, *now is the time* to begin again. Praying, fasting, showing mercy. **Better half-Lent than no Lent at all.**

As we pause, let us ask, what does it mean to want to be holy? to long to be holy? God's life is one of joy and communion, not misery or uncertainty. Father, Son and Spirit in a union of blessing and love. Sharing in *that* life is what we were created *for*. Thus, humans are hard-wired for worship, for joy, for mutual acceptance. Humans are created with a *capax Dei*, literally a *'capacity* for God' – we have a 'God-shaped hole' within us. Today's readings focus on this impulse. In our secular culture, an infinite number of things compete to fill this gap. Not being God, *nothing* else can – not even a spouse or a dearest friend. Simple as that. When we cultivate it, such a longing for God in our hearts frees us and helps us to believe, to adore, to hope and to love God, and to make noble sacrifices for others.

First Reading (OT): 1 Samuel 16.1, 6–7, 10–13 The kings of Israel had various understandings of themselves, their relationship with God and their responsibilities to their people. They were sometimes called son, servant, light of Israel, shield and (2 Samuel 5.2) shepherd. David was elected king precisely because he had a *shepherd's* heart. In the psalm, Psalm 23, we can easily see the likeness between God and the king's role of leadership and protection that David and the best of his successors tried to give Israel.

Second Reading (NT): Ephesians 5.8–14 Light is one of humanity's fundamental symbols. In the first-century cemetery that's under the Vatican

basilica there are some of the earliest depictions of Jesus in art, and he is shown as a young (beardless) sun god. Paul contrasts light with darkness. Light he equates with goodness, darkness with the forces of evil.

Gospel: John 9.1 – 41 We often ask questions about human misfortune. Whose fault was it that this man is blind? Can it be attributed to some sort of guilt? But Jesus uses the man's blindness to reveal God's goodness and power. The paste that Jesus uses to smear the eyes of the blind man reminds us of the ash we all received on the first day of Lent. We are challenged to wash away the self-imposed blindness that prevents us from seeing and confronting our true selves.
