- AFTER the 10am Mass Nothing as adventurous as last week, but drinks and often cakes, and *always* a chance to catch up and share fellowship.

REFLECTION on today's Scriptures The Apostle Paul invites us to draw near to the Gospel "not as the word of a mere human being but – as it really is! – the word of God at work in you" (1 Th 2.13). Thus we can accept with faith the warning that Jesus in the Gospel put to our conscience, in order to conform our way of living to it. In today's passage He rebukes the scribes and the Pharisees, who were the teachers of the community, because their own *conduct* was openly in conflict with the *teaching* they rigorously taught others. Jesus underlines that they "preach, but do not practise" (Mt 23.3). Instead "they bind heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on men's shoulders.

But! they themselves will not lift a finger to move them" (Mt 23.4). Of course, good teaching must be proclaimed; but it risks being contradicted by differing behaviour. Thus Jesus says: "You must do whatever they tell you, but don't do the things they do. They talk they don't do!" (Mt 23.3). Jesus' own behaviour is exactly the opposite: He is the first to practise what He preaches: loving God, loving His neighbours and enemies as Himself. And He can say "the burden is light" and easy because He helps us carry it (see Mt 11.29-30).

"Indeed", says the I2th-century Italian St Bonaventure "no one can teach, or practise, or reach knowable truths, unless the Son of God is present." Jesus, the God-Man, is our true and only teacher! We are, therefore, called to follow Him who expresses the truth of His teaching through His practice of faithfulness to the will of His Father for Him. He is the first teacher, and trains all the other teachers. And He also condemns vanity, observing that "Everything [the Pharisees] do is done to attract attention." (Mt 23.5), putting them at the mercy of human approval.

Dear friends, the Lord Jesus presented himself to the world as a servant, completely stripping himself of power so as to give, on the Cross, the most powerful lesson of humility and love. That example makes credible His teaching, "He who is greatest among you shall be your servant" (Mt 23.11).

A week-long lamp (£10 per lamp) will burn for your intentions in one of three places: the altar of Our Lady, or in the Sanctuary. The intention will appear in the Newsletter. Here ... and Hereafter Last Wednesday, All Saints' Day, we contemplated "[God's] holy city, the heavenly Jerusalem, our mother" (Preface, All Saints). With our hearts still facing toward that ultimate reality, for the rest of November we now commemorate those who have "gone before us with the sign of faith, and rest in the sleep of peace" (Euch. Prayer I): believers who do not, yet, enjoy the company of the saints.

It is very important that we Christians view death and the afterlife in the light of what we are taught in the Scriptures. St Paul, writing his earliest letter, said "We do not want you to have the kind of grief that other people have, people who do not have any hope" (I Th 4.13f). Today, something else is needed: for Christians to speak openly, to be evangelistic, about the reality of death and eternal life (which are subject to any number of superstitious and muddled ideas) so that Christian truth doesn't risk being one illusion among others.

Pope Benedict wrote in one encyclical, "Do men and women of our time still long for eternal life? Or has earthly existence become their only horizon?" All of us want a 'blessed life', happiness. We are attracted to it. The expression 'eternal life' gives a name to this longing. This is what we hope and await from our being with Christ. This is why the Church invites us to pray for our beloved deceased and to pause at their graves in the cemeteries.

But we are *all* responsible for passing our faith to the young. How else will it grow? So, if you know a Catholic family that has a child currently in school-year 3 or above, *please give them a form, with some encouragement.* If you have a child of that age – speak to Carol Anne after any 10am Mass or just fill out the form, *ideally this month*.

Certificates of Catholic Practice for School Applications This is an important document, but please do not cause embarrassment by requesting a certificate if you are not attending Mass here regularly. If you have recently moved into the area, your previous parish priest can easily provide certification. Applications for children who are not Catholic, or are non-practising, can still be made without a certificate, under different admission criteria.
