A WARM WELCOME to Mass today, especially if you are new to the parish. Please take this newsletter home and use the calendar in your daily prayer.

◆ Before Mass, when the tower bell rings:

Pray together: ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Please, let's now keep silence together until Mass begins.

- ◆ During Mass, parents and carers, please feel free to do what you need to keep children content and quiet. Do not hesitate to move around church with them. (The service is amplified into the Narthex too.) And, for everybody's safety, *please* accompany any child who needs to use the toilet while you're in church. Thanks.
- ◆ The ORDER of Mass is in the orange Parish Mass Book. Start on p.7; then, after the Creed, go to p.15; and then, from the Lord's Prayer, go to p.56.
- ◆ Today's readings are to be found pp.125-127 of the *Parish Mass Book*. And the psalm response is:

'O that today you would listen to His voice! Harden not your hearts.'

◆ AFTER the 10am Mass, join us in the church hall, for drinks, often with cakes, and a warm welcome.

REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures Punishment is normally a last resort. Whether it be in families, associations, clubs, schools, professions, or in the work place — even in the Church — punishment is *the last resort*. Punishment may have a disciplinary purpose, but it is normally directed towards helping a person to understand both how his offence is at odds with the common good, and how to make better decisions into the future. The *aim* is not to humiliate, but to *help*; not to leave a person in their guilt, but to *guide* them to a better future.

All parents, teachers, bosses, those who administer justice, aim at achieving this with those under their authority. Those who deal professionally with offenders also have this aim in view. Failure does not undermine the future when it comes to human behaviour.

The scripture readings today direct us to right choices and right behaviour, thus reducing – even eliminating – the need for any resort to punishment.

First Reading (OT): Ezekiel 33.7–9 Ezekiel lived 600 years before Jesus, together with his fellow Israelites in Babylon, in captivity. His whole way of thinking is shaped by exile and homesickness. He sees the fall of Jerusalem, the

peoples' exile, and their decadence (in Babylon and back home), as the result of corrupt and unjust government by their rulers. So, in this passage, God instructs His prophet to invite the people to follow a different path. As the "sentry"—the lookout—of the people of Israel, Ezekiel sees it as his duty to warn them against error. If he, as a prophet (or any other person who recognizes wrong-doing) does not find a way of warning his brother or sister, he will have to answer to God for it. In our own day, not least in the chaotic times through which we are ourselves living, we need such voices—prophetic voices—to speak out for God's ways. That we may be rejected never releases us from speaking out.

Second Reading (NT): Romans 13.8–10 It is obvious that both in the Church and in society regulations and laws need to be adapted to the times: to regulate what kinds of variety is compatible, and exclude what is incompatible. And yet there are certain principles and moral laws that do not need to be corrected or updated. Principles and moral laws that, Christians believe, are permanently true.

Next month will see the first of two major global meetings of the Church in Rome – the so-called 'Synod on Synodality' exploring how the whole universal Church can better walk together in its discernment of the faith, evangelism, and right ethical thinking. The Cardinal has written a Pastoral Letter which will be read next week. But, for starters, watch and listen at https://youtu.be/|FvfixE07iY.

To pick an obvious example: when Jesus affirmed loving our neighbour as ourselves, He affirmed one of the *oldest* texts of the Bible, *Leviticus* 19.34. Already then, many centuries before Christ, the Jews understood that this moral obligation extended *beyond* their own period and race. When it came to moral teaching, Our Lady, Our Divine Lord Himself, and all the principal characters of the new testament, emerged from this same tradition.

Gospel: Matthew 18.15–20 This text must have been shaped by the need to resolve conflicts that arose in the early Christian community. Before and after someone offends God's law, or the community, or you personally, he/she is not a law-breaker but a brother, not a sinner but a sister. To resolve the conflict, and bring about restoration of relationship, there must be an incremental pathway. The aim is to bring the brother or sister to his or her senses, in order that forgiveness may prevail. And the passage ends with Jesus's assurance that where two or more disciples agree—even where the most costly reconciliation has been necessary—Jesus is with them, and in those circumstances Jesus can act.

For a last time, Rose Okosi will read at 8am Mass today. Like her daughter, Rosemary Chukwulobelu, Rose has for many years read at Mass, and I have no doubt that their strong and faith-filled voices will be missed. They would be the first to say that proclaiming the word of God in the midst of the Lord's people is an absolute blessing to the reader, as well as being an instrument in the hands of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of we who listen. Sadly, they are moving out of the area soon. But we will see them back, so occasionally we may hear them too. For now, we thank them deeply and hold them in our prayers.

If any of you would like to be involved in this essential and wonderful ministry, at any of the Masses, please speak to Fr Jonathan. (He'll be dead pleased.)
