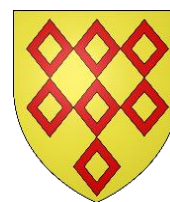

**A WARM WELCOME** to Mass today, especially if you are new to the parish. **Please take this newsletter home** and use the calendar in your daily prayer.

◆ **Before Mass, when the tower bell rings, pray together:** ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires *known*, and from whom *no secrets* are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. *Please, let's now keep silence together until Mass begins.*

◆ **During Mass**, parents and carers, please feel free to do what you need to keep children content and quiet. Do not hesitate to move around church with them. (The service is amplified into the Narthex too.) And, for everybody's safety, *please accompany any child who needs to use the toilet while you're in church.* Thanks.

◆ **The ORDER of Mass** is in the **orange Parish Mass Book**. Start on **p.7**; then, after the Creed, go to **p.15**; and then, from the Lord's Prayer, go to **p.56**.

◆ **Today's readings** are to be found **pp.128-131** of the *Parish Mass Book*. And the psalm response is: **'The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger, and rich in mercy.'**

◆ **AFTER the 10am Mass**, join us in the church hall, for drinks, often with cakes, and a warm welcome.

**REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures** *Ecclesiasticus 27.30-28.7; Romans 14.7-9; Matthew 18.21-35*

Great readings this week! But you have to be prepared to come at them honestly. It's a bit of a bumpy ride.

Few parables in the gospel have such force as the one we hear this Sunday – the Unforgiving Servant. No-one could raise the slightest objection to it – not even those who tell me they don't sin could. Almost no other parable confronts us so dramatically with the resilience of our sinful lovelessness! We judge others by a much higher standard than we want to be judged, ourselves. We constantly think about what we are owed, without giving much of a thought about the hugeness of the debt God has forgiven us. Weekly, even daily, even more often, we absent-mindedly pray the petition of the Lord's Prayer: "Forgive us our trespasses (sins) as we forgive ..." thinking, "one day I'll fathom out what that means". And we fail to think how reluctantly we give up even a scrap of our earthly sense of the justice owed to us, even though God has

waived His heavenly judgement on us!

The reading from the Old Testament recognises all of this in forensic detail: "A man nurses anger against another, and then expects compassion from the Lord!" Can you believe it? Even to the old testament mind this was an utter impossibility. Thus the writer (often called Sirach) appeals not to human feelings, but explicitly to God's covenant, that is the basis of God's forgiveness of Israel's sins. "Think of our covenant with the Most High", he says, "and forgive others' faults! Remember! Remember! Remember! judgement, death, the commandments, and overlook any offence done to you!"

Our second reading builds on this foundation, but the light of Christ's death and resurrection. It's not as if we who judge others even belong to ourselves! We owe our *existence* to God's *creative* goodness; we owe our *future happiness* to His *forgiving* goodness! When St Paul says, "None of us lives for himself", it means two things: you didn't make yourself. Everyone exists because God made him or her. More than that, we owe ourselves even *more* profoundly to the One who has already paid our debt. We are debtors in the deepest sense!

It's more astonishing still that that doesn't make us servants or prisoners: just the opposite! the king in

the parable *freed* the servant whose debts he wrote off. If we owe ourselves to Christ, we are owing ourselves to *Divine* love, that has loved us "to the very end" (Jn 13.1). We are released, enabled, energised, to be able to love and forgive. For every man, woman, and *child*, that is the most wonderful freedom!

"Resentment and anger are hateful things, yet sinners don't half hug 'em, tight!" says the Old Testament. The end of the gospel speaks of the king's *anger* as he throws the unforgiving servant into prison, handing him over to the justice that he had insisted on for himself.

What is this anger of God? It is what a loveless person makes out of God's infinite love. To put it another way, it is the effect that God's love produces in a *loveless* person – someone who shuts the doors of his heart to God's mercy out of a self-centred understanding of debt and forgiveness. He condemns *himself*, clearly condemns himself, just like the man who would not listen to challenge in last week's gospel. God's love judges no one. The verdict is a man's own refusal to accept God's love (Jn 3.18-20; 12.47-48. St James's summary is crystal clear: "Judgement is *merciless* to the man or woman who has not shown any mercy; but mercy *triumphs* over all judgement." And the Lord Himself says, "the ruler you use to measure with, will be used on you!" (Lk 6.38)
