**REFLECTIONS** on today's scriptures The theme of the scripture readings in today's Mass, where we encounter Jesus at the very outset of his public life and on the threshold of his ministry, is calling or vocation. It contains fruit for reflection not only for the young, but for all of us who are already well advanced on the path of life. The Second Vatican Council in the '60s the bishops emphasized that laity as well as clergy are called to holiness, and laity as well as clergy are called to coresponsibility for the mission of the Church.

First Reading: I Samuel 3.3–10, 19 The call of the boy Samuel to the life of a prophet is one of the classic vocation stories. It might encourage our young people that it is *not* the old priest, Eli, who is called but the teenage boy Samuel. Not that he specifically recognises God's voice, he thinks it is Eli calling. For all those who sense a calling, it is often the result of an intuition, an opportunity, a 'coincidence' which only later we see as providential. Samuel's call took place in the Temple itself, and was confirmed by a priest. So, today vocations can arise within the Church and her institutions, or beyond an ecclesiastical context.

- ◆ Today is Peace Sunday Pope Francis' theme for World Day of Peace 2024 is 'Artificial Intelligence and Peace'. It is a highly relevant theme as Governments, including our own, wrestle with the ethics and consequences of technological development, not least in international conflict and political elections. The Pope's message is available on the Noticeboard for you to read, or Google 'World Day of Peace 2024'. The Holy Father's reflection is a moderate but insightful meditation on the risk and promise to humanity that Artificial Intelligence presents. We cannot ignore it; either we focus on and channel its benefits, or the risk that we shall suffer its evils will increase. / There is no second collection, but donations to help our peace and justice agency, Pax Christi, can be made via the envelopes in the Narthex.

#### Second Reading: I Corinthians 6.13-15, 17-20

Here we find the essential elements of Paul's theological thinking about the human body. Respect and gratitude for our own body are at the root of the way we nourish it, exercise it, treat it, and use it - and at the root of our behaviour towards others' bodies. The human body is something that God gives life to and treats as holy: a place fit for the indwelling of the Spirit, the light of faith, and the well-matured conscience.

Gospel: John 1.35–42 This gospel passage is full of young men: Jesus and John the Baptist are just out of their 20s; and the first disciples (who had originally followed John) are definitely still in them. They are curious to know where Jesus lives. We learn a lot about a person who invites us into their home; and above all from the way we are welcomed. Those first disciples were, presumably, welcomed into Jesus' lodging in Capernaum. This prompts a question: 'where is God to be found by the searching youngsters of 2022?' In our churches, at our liturgies, in our homes and presbyteries? But thinking of the second reading – do those who are searching find and recognize Christ at home with us?

Dominus Meus et Deus Meus! Standing, or kneeling, prayerfully, at the altar to receive Holy Communion (as we mentioned last week) is the *culmination* of many ways in which we can (that is, we *should*) prepare for the moment of sacramental union with Christ. Every element in the Mass, likes steps on a path, or rungs on a ladder, gives us a moment and step toward Christ. The little secret prayers of the priest are ways for him too, step by step, to approach the Lord.

One special moment, during the Eucharistic Prayer, comes when, after the words of Christ are used, first the Host, and then the Chalice, are raised for us to worship. 'I, when I am lifted up', will draw all men to myself,' said Jesus. In each of those moments I want to encourage you ...

I as the priest elevates the Host/Chalice, use the traditional acclamation, 'My Lord and my God!' (Dominus meus et Deus meus) – St Thomas's confession when he saw the Risen Lord's wounds.

**2** as the priest returns the Host/Chalice to the altar, use a phrase from a well-known hymn. 'Father, look on us only as found in *Him*.' And

**3** as the priest genuflects, pray by name for whoever you are especially remembering (as your intention) at that Mass. This has been my own habit at that moment for decades. This—and prayers like it—is *true participation* in the Mass. Each of us, priest and lay people, *sharing* in what *Christ* is doing.
